Monitoring and Reporting

All Horizon Europe Partnerships must formulate a reference monitoring framework for their strategic agendas, allowing the progress to be tracked, towards achieving the specific Policy Objectives.

Such monitoring frameworks focus on Partnership-specific objectives and indicators, and the proposed frameworks are meant to allow for a low-burden assessment of the community's need for corrective measures.

Progress towards EOSC-specific policy objectives and deliverables is tracked through a set of:

- the **Additional Activity Plans (AAP)**; and
- the **Key Performance Indicators (KPIs)**.

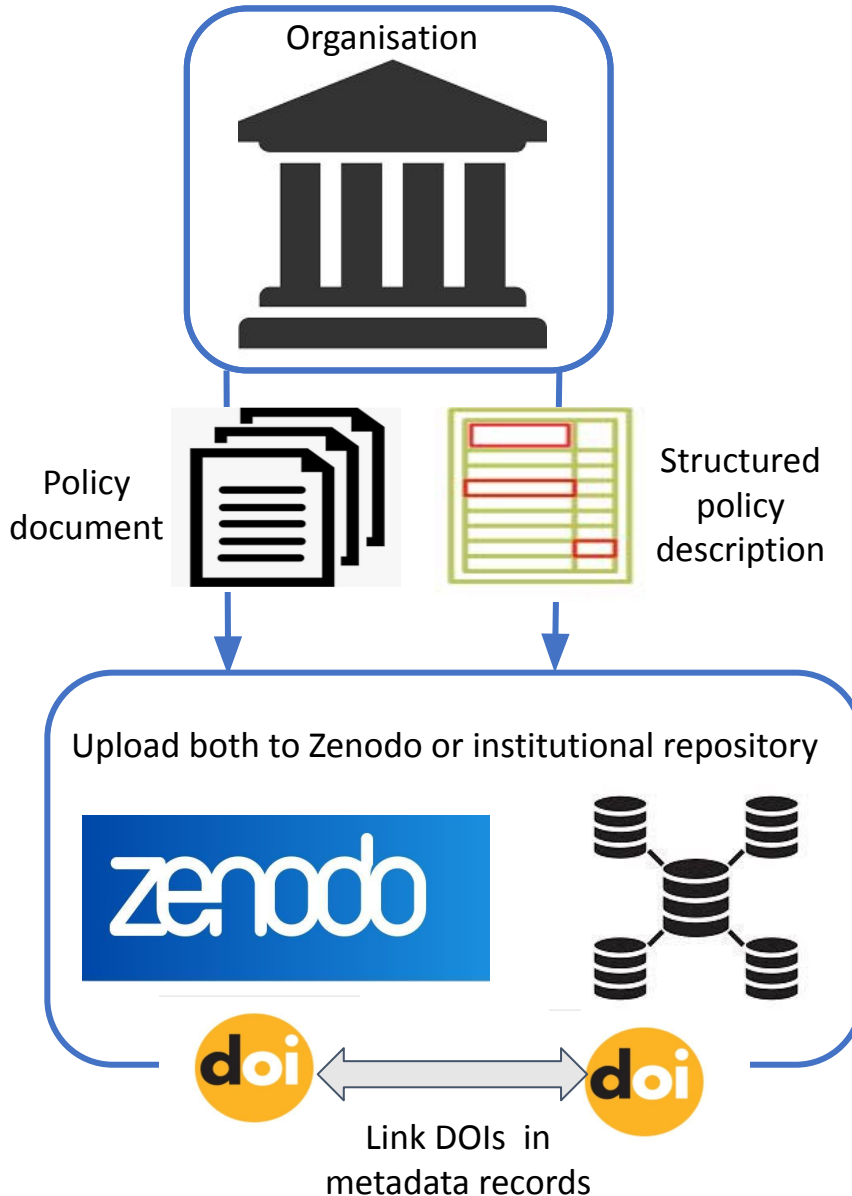

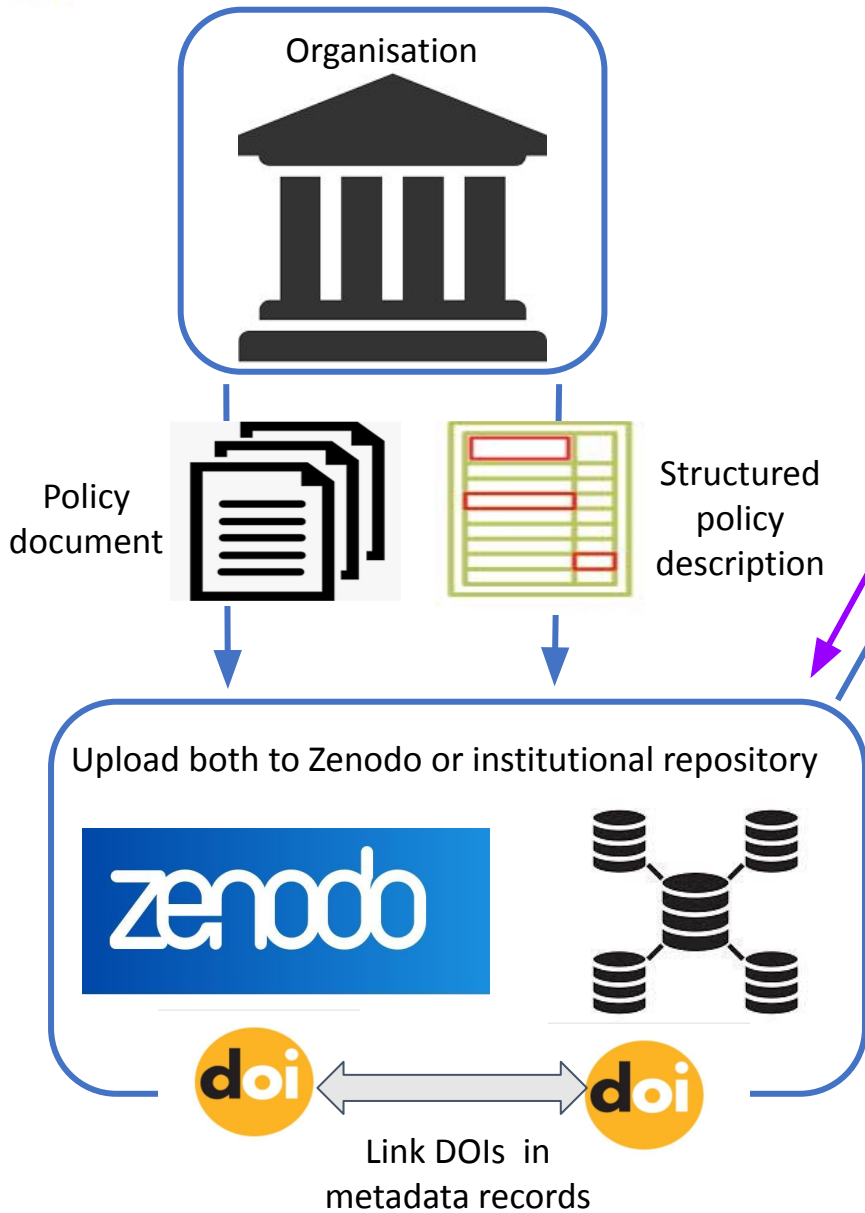
Suggested workflow



- Deposit clearly versioned policy to repository and allocate a PID
- Deposit structured policy to repository and allocate a PID
- Add PID for structured version of the policy to policy document record and vice versa

Register policy and include DOI to deposited versions and vice versa

- Register with FAIRsharing
- Include umbrella DOIs for both versions of your policy

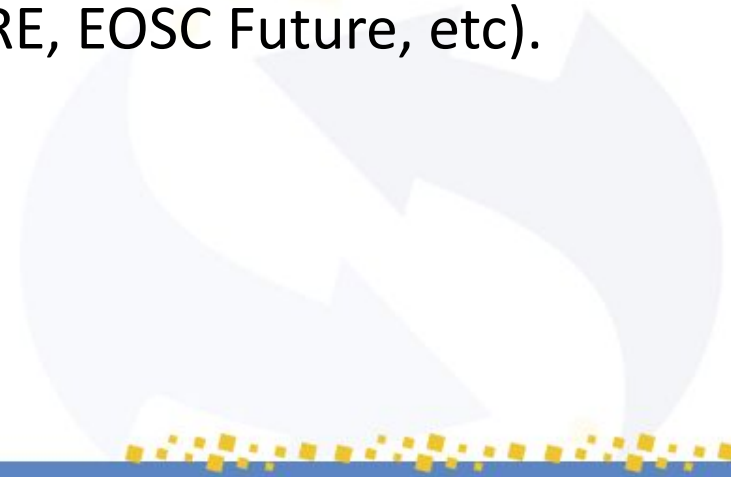






Benefits of this approach

- Ensures policies themselves are FAIR
- Removes gatekeepers and ensures policy-makers are in control of updates as needed over time
- Utilises freely available repositories and registries to make policies and structured descriptions FAIR
- Policies and a structured description of their content are available to multiple users for different uses (EOSC Association, SPARC Europe, OpenAIRE, EOSC Future, etc).



Future opportunities

- Potential to align the FsF policy elements with ongoing FAIRsharing metadata review
- Potential to lead to machine readable versions of structured policy descriptions which could support automated landscape monitoring activities and eventual machine actionable workflows
